### Where to camp

County parks often fly under the radar. They may not always be in name brand locations, but they offer peace and quiet for a fraction of the cost of private campgrounds. They are great for getting back to nature and kicking back and relaxing for the weekend. Think large sites, in beautiful locations, at affordable prices.

#### When to book

Especially true for county parks, and since a surge in RVers, book your sites well in advance. The reward will be huge, and you won't have to scramble later on. Don't add stress when it's not needed.

### How to clean

Pack a bit more simply... multi-purpose products like baking soda and white vinegar will work great for cleaning toilets, sinks and floors. Lemon juice can be used for cleaning faucets and fixtures, cutting boards, countertops and your hands. Castile soap, like Dr. Bronners, mixed with water in a spray has a variety of washing uses.

### How to pack and store

Take care of the campgrounds we love! Reuse things like bottles, bags, clothes, etc. A milk jug or bottle can be used for water or ice. Tic Tac® containers can be used to store spices. Ziploc® bags and tinfoil can be washed and reused.

You'll want to be efficient in how you pack as well. Developing a simple inventory of what you're taking along and what fits where will help on your first few trips in a new RV. While it's true you might want all of those items and more, spare yourself the grief of over packing. Allow time in your schedule for doing laundry, keep your wardrobe simple (while still taking a couple of items appropriate for weather fluctuations) and consider renting gear or living without it.

### How to drive safely
